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
## Country coverage

  - Grenada




# Number of restrictions, by region

No. of policies expected to have a negative impact on digital trade




# Number of restrictions in LAC region

Number of policies expected to impact negatively digital trade




# Number of enabling policies, by region






# Number of enabling policies in LAC region

Number of enabling measures for digital trade




## Preliminary findings: Digital Trade Integration Index

#### Digital Trade Integration Index



#### Average DTI index by policy area




Average DTI index


## Regulatory similarity/heterogeneity by policy area

#### Regulatory similarity by policy area






# Intermediary liability

- Cuba, Honduras and Venezuela show a very strict regulatory environment
- Most countries lack a safe harbor for platforms
- Most countries implement identity requirements




# Telecom infrastructure and competition

- Cuba shows a very restrictive environment
- 7 countries restrict FDI in the sector
- Most countries do not implement functional or accounting separation
- Half of the countries have not appended the Telecom Reference Paper




## Domestic data policies

- 7 countries do not implement comprehensive data protection
- Over half of the countries implement data retention requirements
- 4 countries allow government access to personal data without court order




# DTI index by policy area




#### Content access

- Most countries have a fully open regulatory environment
- Content blocking is only practiced in 3 countries
- Internet shutdown are rare, but practiced in 3 countries



#### Cross-border data transfers

- Over half of the countries implement conditions for transfers of personal data across borders
- 5 countries implement restrictions on the location of certain data processing
- 8 countries have committed to free transfers of data in FTAs



#### Conclusions

- On average, Latin American countries tends to have an open environment for digital trade;
- The countries in the LAC region could consider implementing additional enabling policies to support digital trade;
- Intermediary liability, telecom regulation and policies on the domestic data processing show high potential for regional integration;
- Content access, cross-border data policies, quantitative trade restrictions and standards are policies areas are potentially low-hanging fruits to promote regional integration;
- Future areas of research: empirical analysis to identify policy priorities to promote digital trade integration.
