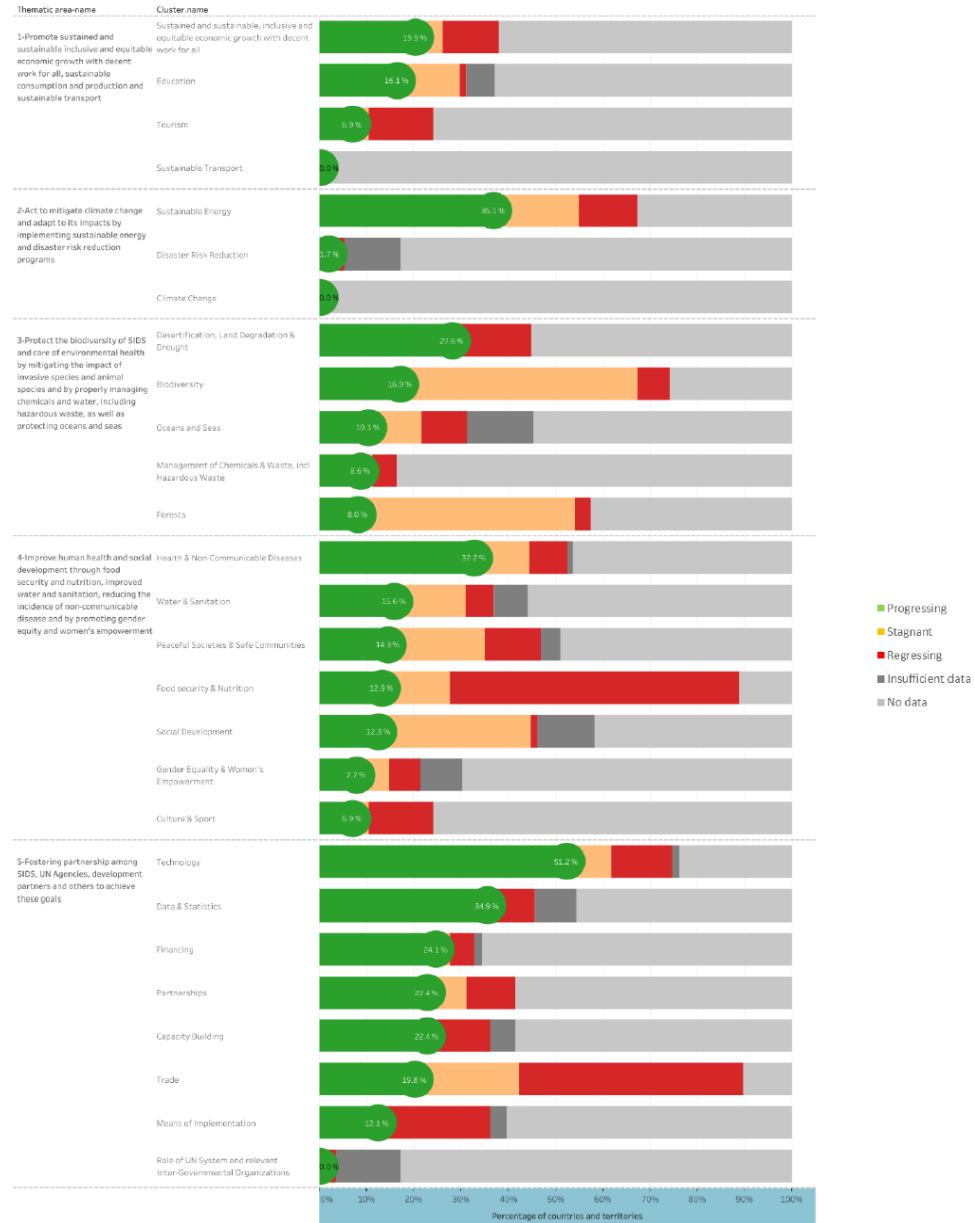

Findings of the Caribbean Regional Synthesis Report

- **Lack of an effective inter-agency regional coordination**
 - Two-thirds (67%) of respondents identified the absence of an interagency mechanism as a gap in monitoring implementation and reporting
 - Successful implementation at the national level requires effective regional coordination
- **Lack of dedicated financing mechanism**
- **Absence of a Monitoring Framework**
 - SAMOA Pathway did not have an M&E at the onset, leading to gaps in monitoring and reporting
 - Although a framework was later developed, countries encountered significant challenges in its implementation (Data gaps; Capacity constraint)
- **Non-integration of civil society**
 - Nongovernmental actors were not sufficient informed/aware, limiting their contribution

Noteworthy....

- Out of the 27 Clusters of the SAMOA Pathway Thematic Areas, 70% of the time, more than half of Caribbean SIDS had insufficient or no data
