## Ms Anna Vitie, Minister Counsellor, Deputy Permanent Representative, Permanent Mission of Finland

Ms Anna Vitie is Deputy Permanent Representative to the WTO, UNCTAD and WIPO in the Permanent Mission of Finland. She brings over 17 years of experience in trade and development. Prior to that she served as Minister Counsellor in the Embassy of Finland in Beijing (2017 – 2020). She also served as a Counsellor and Adviser in the Department for Development Policy in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Finland (2013 – 2017). Ms Vitie held diplomatic postings in the Permanent Mission of Finland in New York (2009 – 2013) and Embassy of Finland in Cairo (2006 – 2009). Ms Vitie holds Master's degree in Political Science from the University of Helsinki.



#### Ms Erika Watanabe Patriota, Deputy Permanent Representative of Brazil

Ms. Erika Watanabe Patriota is Deputy Permanent Representative to the Brazilian Mission to the WTO and other economic organizations in Geneva. She is a Brazilian career diplomat with over 25 years of experience, most of them dedicated to multilateral negotiations. The first 10 years of her diplomatic career were spent in trade negotiations in Mercosur (services) and negotiations at the WTO, in the areas of services (GATS), environmental goods and services, and dispute settlement, as a member of the Brazilian dispute settlement team in Geneva. From 2013 to 2015, Ms. Watanabe headed the Human Rights section at the Permanent Mission of Brazil to the UN, in New York. Ms Watanabe Patriota has also been assigned Deputy Consul General to Mumbai, Tokyo, and Deputy Consul to New York and Geneva.

#### Ms Araceli Fernandez Pales, Head of Technology Innovation Unit, IEA

Araceli Fernandez currently serves at the International Energy Agency as the Head of the Technology and Innovation Unit within the Energy Technology Policy division. Araceli manages research, analytical and scenario modelling activities on clean technologies for end-use sectors in that Division. She also supervises the process to monitor the readiness level of clean technologies across the energy sector and to track clean energy progress. Before joining the IEA in 2012, Araceli served in different roles in the Oil & Gas sector including process optimization, detailed engineering, new processes licensing and emissions monitoring for refinery and petrochemical projects. Araceli holds a MEng in Chemical Engineering from the Polytechnical University of Valencia (Spain) and a MSc in Process Engineering from Cranfield University (UK).



## Mr Andres Valenciano Yamuni, Director for the Washington DC office, Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC)

Mr Andres Valenciano Yamuni is the Director for the ECLAC Washington Office. Previously he was the Minister of Foreign Trade of Costa Rica. Prior to that he was the Executive President of the Instituto Nacional de Aprendizaje, Executive Director of several local and international NGOs. Mr Valenciano is Industrial Engineer from the University of Costa Rica, with a Master's degree in International Business from The Fletcher School - Tufts University, Master's degree in Public Administration from Harvard Kennedy School, and a Lee Kuan Yew School Senior Fellow from the National University of Singapore.



#### Ms An Qi, Associate Research Professor, Renewable Energy Development Research Center, Energy Research Institute, Chinese Academy of Macroeconomic Research

An Qi has been working on China's energy transition strategies and policies, energy system analysis and outlook, renewable energy development and distributed generation, energy market reform and carbon pricing, she has been taking the leading role in developing research projects in low-carbon, smart and flexible power system transition, along with the development of supporting market mechanisms. An Qi has been consistently providing technical support to the Chinese government on international dialogues of energy and climate change. She participated as a member of the China Delegation for COP26 and COP27, engaged in the review process for IPCC-AR6, and served as a member of the Technical Supporting Team to G20 Energy Ministerial Meeting chaired by



China in 2016. She acted as a member of the China Expert Team of G20 peer review for China and the United States on Inefficient Fossil Fuel Subsidies, and contributed as a panelist to the G20/APEC peer reviews on energy subsidies for Germany, Mexico, Indonesia, Italy, and New Zealand. An Qi has worked on secondment to International Energy Agency. She graduated from Oxford University with an MEng in Engineering Science.

## Ms Enja Sæthren, Head of Government Relations and Support Mechanisms, Scatec

Enja Sæthren is Head of Government Affairs and Support Mechanisms in Scatec. She leads the company's strategic engagement with institutional bodies and political decision makers to attract more renewable energy investments to emerging markets. Sæthren holds a master's degree in international relations from Sciences Po Paris and has a background in diplomacy and humanitarian affairs from Nepal to West-Africa, having worked for UN WFP, the Food Security Cluster, the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA), the Council of Europe and Plan International. She has also previously worked as a researcher in migration and trade policies at Princeton University and European Policy Center. **Mr James Irungu Mwangi, CEO, Africa Climate Ventures** 

James Irungu Mwangi is the founder and CEO of Africa Climate Ventures.. James is also the founder of the Climate Action Platform for Africato help unlock Africa's potential to transform its economies while playing a leading role in effective climate action. Prior to that, James helped found the Dalberg Group, and in a 20-year career, led the firm's expansion into Africa in 2007, served as Global Managing Partner of Dalberg Advisors, and finally as Executive Director of the Dalberg Group. In 2022, James received the Climate Breakthrough Award in recognition of his efforts to shift Africa's role in responding to the Climate Crisis. James holds an honors degree in economics from Harvard University.
