Who are they?



In 2015 girl children and adolescents aged 0-19 years in Latin America and the Caribbean numbered 107 million, 17% of the regional population.

55% Girl children and adolescents

live in 55% of Latin American households. 40% of those households are in situation of poverty.

Gender equality starts right from early childhood, meaning urgent action must be taken to eradicate all forms of discrimination that affect girl children and adolescents in the region.

According to the latest round of censuses in 2010

54% of girl children and adolescents in Brazil are of African descent.

37% of girl children and adolescents in Bolivia belong to indigenous peoples.

The barriers to women's economic autonomy begin early



of girl adolescents aged 15 to 19 had given birth to a child, as of 2010. The incidence of adolescent maternity is greater among indigenous peoples.

Girl adolescents aged 15-17 spend almost double the number of hours on unpaid work than boys the same age.



Combat child marriage and gender violence.
