Session 2. Governance and stakeholders' engagement and capacities to implement the SDGs	
08:45-10:00	 Understanding existing institutional dynamics and promoting collaborative governance structures supportive of SDG implementation is critical to ensuring the commitment and realization of what has been planned. Building ownership is only possible with a high-quality stakeholder involvement, a strong political commitment and the existence of policy coordination mechanisms that involve civil society and the private sector and that can resolve conflicts or inconsistencies between policies and political interests. The Module will aim to address these aspects, create an enabling environment for participatory work and provide further foundation for subsequent modules. Describe key elements and good practices in adjusting governance arrangements to ensure inclusive engagement and integrated policies for the implementation of the SDGs; b. Session 5. Assessing governance and institutional capacities for policy coherence and integration		
	This module will deal with how institutions and governance influence policy coherence. The SDGs call for an unprecedented level of policy integration and cross- governmental coordination and collaboration. Collaborative decision-making and institutions that can work across portfolio boundaries is required. Institutions are an integral part of the SDGs, on par with the other goals, and governance capacity needs to be strengthened, starting with the institutions, processes and attitudes which refers to the politics of policy coherence. The module will also preview how institutional aspects can be mainstreamed and promote coherence across the key stages of planning, budgeting and M&E.
