The Initiative

Establishment and facilitation of an <u>SDGs Catalysts Network</u> – an informal network of 20+ leading Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) working across sectors to address the range of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in Trinidad and Tobago.



Objectives of the SDGs Catalyst Network:

Advocacy

 Develop collective civil society positions and facilitate and promote joint advocacy to influence sectoral and national policy for implementation of the SDGs

Action

 Mobilise and encourage civil society action for implementation the SDGs and support reporting on civil society contribution to delivery of SDGs

Partnerships

 Improve capacities for more effective partnerships among CSOs and between civil society and government and other development partners


Participation

 Ensure effective civil society engagement in the prescribed national coordination mechanism for the SDGs being led by the Government

We believe that CSOs will be able to participate more effectively in SDG advocacy and implementation if they are well informed about the SDGs and inspired by what other Caribbean CSOs are doing



How can we enhance collaboration and partnerships with civil society for sustainable development? Encourage governments to support self-organisation and capacity building within national civil society networks for effective representation and voice Create spaces for CSOs to be formally represented on decisionmaking bodies and structures (e.g. national committees) and include civil society representatives on national delegations to intergovernmental fora

Engage civil society in the formal process to monitor national implementation, while recognising the value of independent monitoring and review by civil society (shadow or spotlight reports).

Create credible spaces for knowledge exchange and sharing to help enhance capacity and visibility nationally and regionally
